Michelson Found Animals Pet Poison Prevention




HUMAN FOOD

Many human foods aren't good for our animal friends including: **chocolate, grapes, raisins, garlic, onions, alcohol and artificial sweeteners.**



HOUSE PLANTS

Common poisonous houseplants include **lilies, azaleas, tulips, daffodils, poinsettias, and hyacinths.**



HOUSEHOLD PRODUCTS

Common household products like **paint, cleaners, pool additives and rat poison** are all toxic when ingested by pets.



LAWN & GARDEN PRODUCTS

Watch out for **fertilizer, pesticides, soil additives and even compost** which can contain mold.



FLEA & TICK PRODUCTS

Make sure to use the **proper doses for flea and tick preventatives.** When in doubt, opt for **green or organic treatments.**



MEDICATIONS

Both human and pet **medications should be kept out of reach from pets.** Even animals can overdose on pet medications!

What Pet Dangers Are in Your Garage

It is not uncommon for our furry friends to get into hidden hazards in the garage that can cause serious harm. You can help to keep your pets safe by reviewing the information below from our experts at the ASPCA® Animal Poison Control Center to make sure that your garage is safe for your four-legged friend.

Latex paints can cause upset stomach and dermal irritation if it gets in your pet's coat.

Rat, mouse and mole baits (rodenticides) can cause a variety of signs, but often can be deadly. *Keep in mind that mice and rats can often move baits into reach of pets.*

Weed killer (herbicide) can cause upset stomach, ulcers and oral irritation

Antifreeze containing ethylene glycol can cause kidney damage and death

Ice melts can cause changes in electrolytes and oral irritation

Slug and snail baits are very toxic to pets and can cause seizures and death

Fertilizers can cause very upset stomach, muscle pain and weakness
